The Long Beach Police Department's Chiefs of Police



The First Chief of Police

Thomas W. Williams - 1908 to 1910 Williams served as an elected City Marshal and an appointed City Marshal before becoming the first Chief of Police.

The Second Chief of Police

Clarence E. Moyer - 1910 to 1912 Clarence Moyer was Chief of Police when the Department's first "killed in the line of duty" death occurred.





The Third Chief of Police

Dr. Albert Bennett Austin - 1912 to 1914 Before becoming Chief of Police, Dr. Austin was a dentist practicing in the First National Bank building in Long Beach.

The Fourth Chief of Police

Charles Cavender Cole - 1914 to 1919 At age thirty-six, Chief Cole was the youngest man ever to be appointed Long Beach Chief of Police.



The Fifth Chief of Police

Ralph A. Newell - 1919 to 1920
Prior to his appointment as Chief of
Police, Ralph Newell had served as a
Deputy Constable during Chief
Moyer's Administration.





James I. Butterfield - 1920 to 1920 James Butterfield had been instrumental in instituting the City Manager form of government in the City of Long Beach.



Ben W. McLendon - 1921 to 1922 Prior to coming to Long Beach, Ben McLendon served as a police officer and constable in El Paso, Texas.



The Eighth Chief Of Police

James Selwyn Yancy - 1922 to 1933 James Yancy was the first Chief of Police to authorize department personnel to use the .45 automatic handgun.

The Ninth Chief of Police

Joseph Henry McClelland - 1933 to 1939 In 1934 Chief McClelland ordered all officers to obtain home telephones so they could be contacted if needed.





The Tenth Chief of Police

William Cyrus Wright - 1939 to 1941 Chief Wright developed the first police pistol range on city land at Wardlow and Palo Verde and rode with the Mounted Police in their first Rose Parade, 1940.

The Eleventh Chief of Police

Joseph Henry McClelland - 1941 to 1943
Joseph McClelland was the first man to
be appointed to two distinct terms as Long
Beach Chief of Police.



The Twelfth Chief of Police

Walter H. Lentz - 1943 to 1944
After leaving office, Chief Lentz became a private detective and chief special agent for the California
Attorney General.



Alvin Frank Slaight - 1944 to 1949 After leaving the Department, Al Slaight moved to Ellsworth, Kansas where he became a cattle rancher and farmer.



The Fourteenth Chief of Police

William H. Dovey - 1949 to 1960 As a young soldier, Chief Dovey was awarded the Purple Heart after being wounded in the battle of Argonne Wood during World War I.



The Fifteenth Chief of Police

William John Mooney - 1960 to 1975 With nearly fifteen years in office, Chief William Mooney was the longest serving Long Beach Chief of Police.

The Sixteenth Chief of Police

Ralph Glen Kortz - 1975 to 1977 Ralph Kortz, eligible to retire in 1955, was appointed Chief of Police after serving forty-one years on the Long Beach Police Department.



The Seventeenth Chief of Police

Carl J. Calkins - 1977 to 1979
Chief Calkins was the first "outside" Chief
to be appointed, having been a Captain with the Los
Angeles Police Department before coming
to Long Beach.

The Eighteenth Chief of Police

Charles B. Ussery - 1979 to 1986 Charles Ussery was the Long Beach Police Department's first black Chief of Police.



The Nineteenth Chief of Police

Lawrence L. Binkley - 1987 to 1992 Chief Binkley had been a Los Angeles Police Department Commander before he became Chief of Police in Long Beach.



The Twentieth Chief of Police

William C. Ellis - 1992 to 1996
Chief Ellis made Community Policing a department-wide practice; he implemented a five-year Strategic Plan, and increased the number of sworn officers on the Department.

The Twenty-First Chief of Police

Robert M. Luman - 1996 to 1999
Chief Luman approved the Long Beach Police
Millennium badge and authorized its use
by all Department personnel.



Jerome E. Lance - 1999 to 2002

During his time of service, from the 1970s on, Chief Lance brought the Long Beach Police Department into the computer age.

The Twenty-Third Chief of Police

Anthony W. Batts - 2002 to Present Anthony Batts is the "Centennial Chief of Police" and the first Long Beach Chief of Police to earn a PhD.

Long Beach City Marshals

Prior to the appointment of a Chief of Police, an elected City Marshal administered the Long Beach Police Department
