	10	WHEREAS, on September 17, 2018, Governor Brown signed into law
	11	Senate Bill (SB 946), also known as the Safe Sidewalk Vending Act; and
	12	WHEREAS, SB 946 decriminalized sidewalk vending statewide and
	13	established parameters for how sidewalk vending may be enforced by local jurisdictions;
	14	and
		WHEREAS, despite the passage of SB 946, the California Retail Food
	16	Code imposes restrictions and requirements that are not in alignment with the City
	17	Council's intent to support small-scale sidewalk food vending; and
	18	WHEREAS, a recent report from the Public Counsel and the UCLA School
	19	of Law Community Economic Development Clinic titles "Unfinished Business: How Food
	20	Regulations Starve Sidewalk Vendors of Opportunity and What Can be Done to Finish
	21	the Legalization of Street Food" outlines the financial and administrative barriers for
	22	small-scale sidewalk vendors of food to legally vend food; and
	23	WHEREAS, sidewalk vending of food promotes important
	24	entrepreneurship and economic development opportunities to low income and
	25	immigrant communities; and
	26	WHEREAS, since the City is preempted by State law, changes to the
	27	California Retail Food Code are necessary for the City to lower barriers for sidewalk
	28	food vendors to obtain a health permit from the Department of Health and Human

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1 Services and to operate legally; and

NOW, THEREFORE, the City Council of the City of Long Beach resolves as
follows:

Section 1. The City of Long Beach hereby recommends to the State
Legislature, at a minimum, make the following changes to the California Retail Food
Code:

A. Streamline approvals for code-compliant carts, including giving more discretion to local health authorities to approve innovative designs and encouraging the pre-approval of cart design blueprints to catalyze manufacturing of affordable sidewalk carts at a scale that meets need; and

B. Revise regulations around the slicing of fruits and vegetables and the hot-holding of prepared foods to establish clear and easy-to-follow safety protocols that account for the types of foods commonly sold by sidewalk vendors; and

C. Simplify onerous sink, power, water, fire safety and other equipment requirements; and

D. Create a process for addressing non-compliance without criminal penalties; and

E. Make food safety regulations more sensitive to the context of sidewalk food vending.

Section 2. The City Clerk is directed to transmit a copy of this resolution
to Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon, Senator Lena Gonzalez and Senate President
Pro Tem Toni Atkins, and to other officials, agencies, entities, and individuals as may be
deemed appropriate by the City Manager.

26 Section 3. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption 27 by the City Council, and the City Clerk shall certify the vote adopting this resolution.

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
