Food Finders Hub Opens at Admiral Kidd Park



Parks, Recreation and Marine in coordination with Food Finders distributes food to those experiencing food insecurity within the community.

The community is now able to access fresh food at a new Food Finders (Hub), provided by the nonprofit organization Food Finders Inc., at Admiral Kidd Park to serve individuals experiencing a high level of food insecurity.

Long Beach Parks, Recreation and Marine's Park Planning and Partnership Bureau coordinated the partnership with Food Finders. The Long Beach Health and Human Services (LBHHS) worked to select a location for the Hub that would best serve the needs of residents. A grand opening ceremony for the Hub was held on April 30.

Food Finders will staff the Hub and manage weekly food distribution and monthly programming, including a community marketplace, through their network of partners. The Hub contains a refrigerated container that can safely store produce, dairy and other perishable food items. In response to the increased need for access to healthy food throughout the COVID-19 pandemic, LBHHS, in partnership with local food banks and community partners, has been organizing and supporting ongoing large-scale emergency food distribution

events across the city. The partnership with Food Finders enhances the existing emergency food distribution efforts taking place in Long Beach.

Food Finders, founded in 1989, is a food rescue nonprofit organization with a primary focus of reducing hunger while also reducing food waste by improving nutrition in food insecure communities. Through their work, millions of pounds of wholesome food are saved every year.

Since the early stages of the pandemic, LBHHS and community partners have used Admiral Kidd Park as an emergency food distribution site. The Park is located near the LBHHS's West Facilities Center, which provides the City's Women, Infants and Children Supplemental Nutrition Program. The nearby Boys and Girls Clubs of Long Beach's also provides meal and grocery services to local families in need.

Naturalist Notes: Don't Be a Birdnapper!



Spring is just around the corner and El Dorado Nature Center staff are preparing for questions from the public about injured or orphaned wildlife. Baby birds are common to find around our homes and neighborhoods, and people are often unsure of the proper steps for caring for them.

It is important to recognize when birds are really in need of help. According to the Founder of the Songbird Care and Education Center (SCEC) (www.songbirdcareandeducation.org/foundababybird.html) “Nestlings are birds that are naked, have pin feathers or down. They are dependent on their parents. Fledglings are feathered with short tails. They

are learning to fly and should be left alone. Their parents are close by and will continue to support them.”

Three facts from SCEC about baby birds and their parents:

1. Birds only need to be rescued if they are injured, cat caught, icy cold, or abandoned.
2. Parent birds will search for their babies even after 24-48 hours of absence.
3. Parent birds will feed their babies after you have touched them.

If you find a bird in distress, call the Nature Center 562.570.1745, and we will be happy to put you in contact with a wildlife rehabilitation group.

Earth Day and Arbor Day Tree Plantings



To celebrate Earth Day and Arbor Day in April, Parks, Recreation and Marine and community partners planted dozens of trees to enhance our urban forest and park landscapes throughout the city. The Office of State Senator Lena Gonzales donated ten trees so that two trees each could be planted at Ramona, Hudson, Chavez, Scherer and MacArthur Parks.

The momentum will continue with upcoming tree plantings in June with One Earth Long Beach, an organization that works with youth to plant and care for trees in Long Beach. The group plans to plant nine trees each at Heartwell and Recreation Park, as well as donating two trees each to be planted at Stearns Champions and Orizaba Parks.

Volunteers Make a Difference at Beach and Park Cleanups

In celebration of Earth Week, Parks, Recreation and Marine's El Dorado Nature Center staff hosted their annual Earth Day Beach Cleanup on April 16. The event allowed residents to take a part in maintaining the health and beauty of our ocean-front. 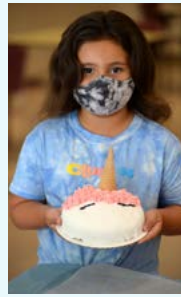

Sunnyside Cemetery Thriving Under the Care of Parks, Recreation and Marine

Parks, Recreation and Marine Grounds Maintenance staff upgraded the irrigation system, developed a



watering schedule to promote healthy turf recovery and began addressing gopher control issues. Many Long Beach residents have found their final resting place at Sunnyside Cemetery and their families are appreciative of the maintenance and conservation efforts that are now ongoing.

Partners of Parks Purchases Equipment for Admiral Kidd Playground Rebuild



The non-profit Partners of Parks (POP) organization has been working diligently to raise money for a new playground at Admiral Kidd Park, 2125 Santa Fe Ave. The park's nautical-themed playground was destroyed in a fire on July 18, 2021. The park is named after Rear Admiral Isaac Kidd who died in Pearl Harbor and was stationed in Long Beach during his service in the US Navy.

POP's campaign began in October 2021 and has raised more than \$450,000 including support from the Earl B. and Loraine H. Miller Foundation, Marathon Petroleum Foundation, Amazon, the New L Family Fund and Junior League of Long Beach.

POP announced on April 19 that they placed an order for the playground equipment from Landscape Structures, Inc. to

begin the process of rebuilding the playground. The Department of Public Works will develop a construction schedule when the equipment shipping date is determined. The additional funds raised will go towards playground surfacing and foundation, storage, and build and permit costs.

On March 8, 2022, the Long Beach City Council approved the use of approximately \$550,000 in surplus budget funds from the Fiscal Year 2021 Measure A to fulfill the remainder of the estimated \$1 million project after all Partners of Parks funding requests have been completed.
