Measure A - Context

 The Measure A extension approved on March 3, 2020, keeps the 1 percent in place until voters decide to end it

 New dollars from the extension are not realized until FY 23. Due to County Measure H, Measure A will drop to ¾ percent in 2023

 Measure A will not return to the full 1 percent rate until 2028

Measure A - Maintain Public Safety

- Measure A have allowed the City to maintain and restore public safety services that would have otherwise been reduced
- \$2.9 million added in FY 23 made up of \$1.9 million to solve the Fire Department's budget issue related to their FY 20 budget reduction target, and \$1.1 million to cover the Police Department's increasing cost of doing business such as the crime lab lease costs and other expenses

- \$0.61 million Engine 17 estimated City match funding needed for SAFER grant
- \$2.2 million Support the new Strategic Outreach and Prevention (STOP) Detail to expand the Neighborhood Walks concept of crime reduction through increased outreach and community engagement

Measure A - Public Safety One-Times

- 2-year outreach and clean-up initiative along the city's river beds. \$2.1 million
- Acquisition of vehicles to support the 2-year river bed clean-up program. \$0.35 million
- Coordinated Response Team support that is working to reduce overall violent crime citywide with emphasis on gunrelated crimes. \$1 million
- Public Safety communications debt payment for 2018 purchase of public Motorola radios. \$1.93 million

Measure A - Other Critical Needs One-Times

- Community Hospital \$1 million
- Network Camera Modernization that will upgrade obsolete cameras and establish a lifecycle replacement. \$2.78 million
- Structurally defective tree removal at parks to enhance the safety of park patrons by removing approximately 1,200 poor quality trees. \$1.8 million
- Crack Seal and Slurry Program vehicles to support the in house preparation and application of slurry seal and crack seal on City streets. \$0.68 million

Measure A - Other Critical Needs One-times (continued)

- Magnetic door locks and restroom renovation initiative will allow for approximately 20 park locations to retrofit an estimated 52 doors with magnetic timed locking system.
 \$0.6 million
- Critical needs reserve for unexpected needs and contingency use. \$3.89 million
- Infrastructure debt service payment for infrastructure bonds backed by Measure A funds to support the new 5 Year Infrastructure plan. \$1.75 million

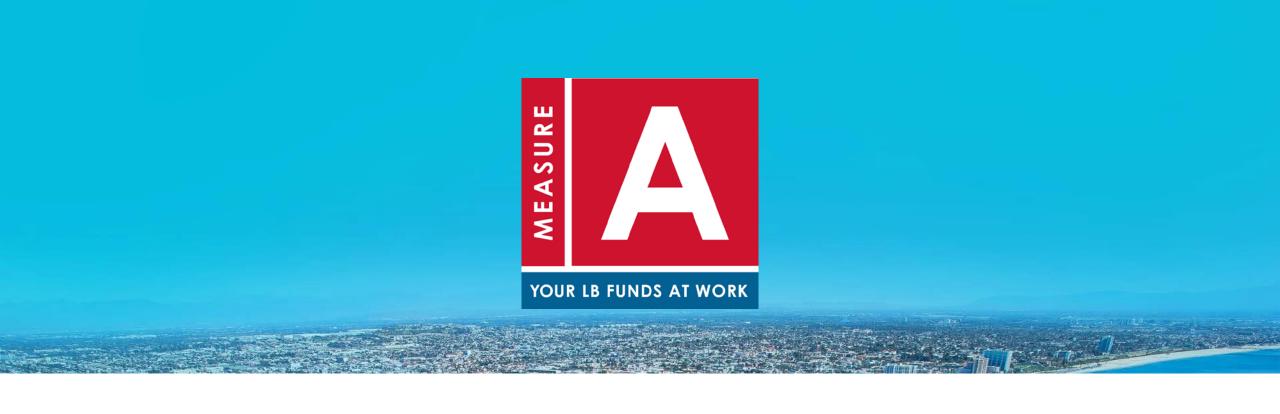
FY 23 Proposed Measure A Admin and Measure B Stabilization Fund

- Administrative Support \$208,458- 1 FTE
- Measure B Budget Stabilization Fund \$674,476
 - Automatic deposits of one percent of any new general tax revenues generated each year, commencing with FY 17
 - Since inception, \$2,403,203 has been set-aside related to Measure A.
 - In FY22 and FY 23, it is anticipated an additional \$1,493,099 set aside related to Measure A will be deposited to the reserve
 - The FY 23 Measure B Stabilization ending fund balance is projected to be approximately \$4,397,769 across all general tax deposits

Key Highlights

- 38 park playgrounds, community centers, and park facility projects completed;
- Nearly 640 lane miles of streets repaired;
- Over 7.5 miles of alleys, of which 5.1 miles were formerly dirt, rehabilitated;
- Over 1,370,000 sq. ft. of sidewalks replaced and over 2,680 curb ramps replaced;
- 22 Public Facility projects completed, including:
 - 4 fire station projects,
 - 5 health and public safety projects, and
 - 10 library projects.

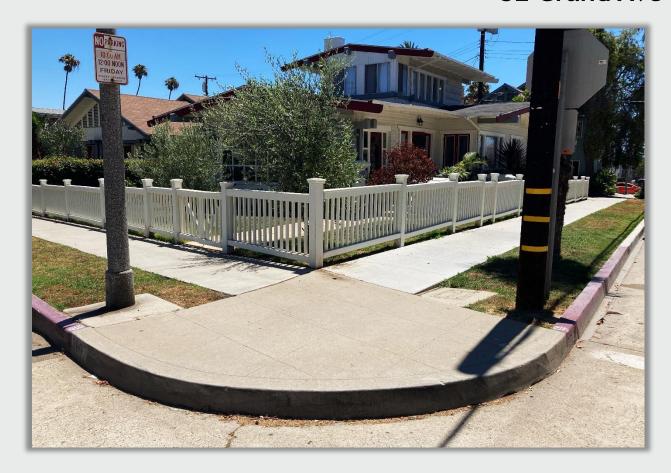


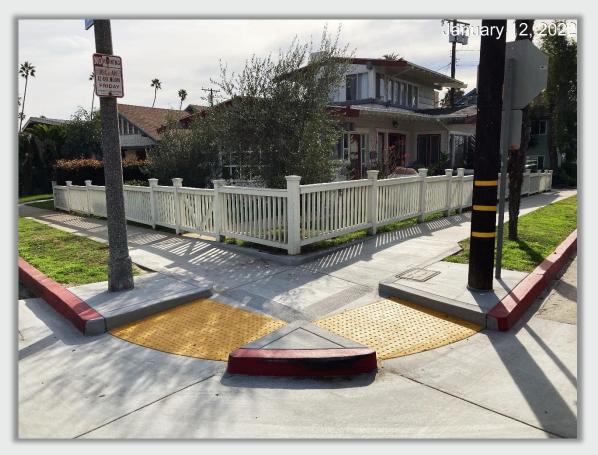
