Coastal Cleanup Day Volunteers Make a Difference at City Beaches











The El Dorado Nature Center staff coordinated a successful California Coastal Cleanup (CCC) Day event on September 17.

The team welcomed volunteers at six locations in Long Beach including Junipero Beach, Belmont Pier, 54th Place and Claremont Ave., Peninsula Beach. Mother's Beach and the Seal Beach Yacht Club area. From 9 a.m. to noon, almost 1,200 volunteers picked up an estimated 3,000 pounds of trash. It was great to see volunteers cleaning



the beach after a storm the previous weekend brought in extra debris.

The California Coastal Commission reports that more than 27,000 volunteers removed over 125 tons of debris at CCC events across the state.

The El Dorado Nature Center encourages environmental stewardship and conducts an ongoing Adopt-A-Beach program as well as 3rd Saturday cleanups at Colorado Lagoon and 4th Saturday cleanups El Dorado Regional Park.

Director's Corner

Autumn is upon us and our parks and beaches are looking great. Although not quite as heavily patronized as the busy months of summer, park landscapes are strikingly beautiful with the colorful fall foliage. As a Department, we are thankful that to have managed to make it through the Metropolitan Water District's outdoor watering restrictions that lasted two weeks during some extreme heat days. Mother Nature helped greatly with some natural rainfall to maintain the greenness of our sports fields and open lawn areas.

With local schools back in full swing, our Community Recreation Services team has been coordinating the staff coverage at after-school sites to double the capacity now available thanks to the increase in State of California funding. The CRS Team was very involved in the recent Youth Festival that was held in Lincoln Park the last Sunday in September. Well attended and involving scores of community resources, the event attracted hundreds of area youth and families for a fun day in our newest park.

So many great advancements over at Long Beach Animal Care Services have been celebrated lately! The return of regular hours of pet adoption for the public has contributed to an all-time record of annual adoptions. As of this publication of We Create Community, over 1,300 animals have successfully found new adoptive homes, up from the previous year's

record of 900. New staff and volunteers are helping make a huge difference in operations and improved customer service. The newly paved and striped parking lot adds enhanced curb appeal to the facilities along with helpful directional signs.

The City of Long Beach began its new fiscal year budget on October 1, 2022. Our Department will see significant capital improvement projects begin soon and you are encouraged to watch our website for project progress and significant updates. One major project finally taking flight is the renovations of the El Dorado Park West Duck Pond. A perimeter construction fence has been erected and efforts are underway to relocate wildlife who have made the Duck Pond their home. We are grateful for the professional assistance of Humane Rescue to help re-home the flightless birds before the pond is de-watered this month.

The department's fiscal year 2023 operating budget of \$74 million contains welcomed structural budget enhancements for beautification efforts that include tree trimming, weed abatement, and water for irrigation. Investments in maintenance staffing, animal care medical services, and an array of customer service improvements are on the way. An impressive half-decade of proposed infrastructure improvement projects includes approximately \$100 million for Parks, Recreation, Marine and Animal Care facilities.

October has awesome seasonal events that include many 'trunk or treat' Halloween events at our community centers and the 26th Annual Historical Cemetery Tour planned for Saturday, October 29th from 9a.m. to 3p.m. Stay safe and have fun throughout the month of October. 

Beach Maintenance Team Keeps Peninsula Area Safe During Storm



On the evening of Thursday, September 8, Long Beach was hit with a combination of high tides, surf and swells that washed out almost all the sand berms in the low-lying Peninsula area. Beach Maintenance crews jumped into action running dozers, front end loaders and dump trucks to repair the road so work on rebuilding the berm was completed before the next high tide event. While staff was successful in restoring the most berms, there was a complete washout in impact zones between 64 – 67th Places. Thanks to the crews from the Harbor, Water, Energy, and Public Works Fleet Maintenance Departments who came in to help support the 24-hour operation, for a total of six days and five nights.



Long Beach Animal Care Services Offers Safety Reminders About Coyotes

This is the time of year that coyote pups become more visible in the community because they are growing up and leaving their dens more frequently. Coyotes do not require open space survive and have successfully adapted to living in urban and suburban neighborhoods.

Coyotes can be seen at any time of day, although they are most active at dusk, dawn and at night. Residents are reminded to follow important safeguards to protect pets and property against these and other wild or unwanted animals.

The following techniques are recommended to compassionately co-exist with coyotes and to protect yourself and your pets:

- Keep pets, especially cats and small dogs, inside.
- · Keep pet food indoors, and if feeding pets outdoors, supervise feeding and remove the food bowls within an hour.
- Stay close to pets when they are outside and keep them on a leash, especially between dusk and dawn.
- · Harvest ripe fruit from trees and remove fallen fruit from the ground. Covotes can climb trees to eat fruit.
- · Bag food waste and make sure trash containers are securely closed.

Use "hazing" techniques to shoo away coyotes, such as:

- Standing tall, yelling and waving arms.
- Using a whistle, air horn, bell or other noisemaking device.
- Banging pots or pans together.
- · Stomping your feet.
- · Flashing bright lights at the coyote.
- · Spraying the coyote with a water hose or pepper spray.
- Throwing tennis balls or sticks toward the coyote.
- Never run from a coyote. Running from a coyote can instigate the coyote's prey instinct to chase.
- Never feed coyotes or any other outdoor or wild animals.

Long Beach's Coyote Management Plan outlines how Animal Care Services can respond to concerns about coyotes. Email animalcare@longbeach.gov or call 562.570.7387 to request informational flyers, schedule a speaker for a neighborhood watch or community meeting or to determine if an Animal Control Officer is needed.

It is important to make reports about any coyote activity and encounters to Long Beach Animal Care Services by visiting www.longbeach.gov/acs/wildlife. An Animal Control Officer will respond to covote calls if the covote is sick or injured, or out in the daytime in areas near people, especially children at parks or schools or anytime there is an attack or threatening behavior toward a person or pet. If a coyote is posing an imminent threat to life, call 9-1-1.
