Cambodian American Cultural Center



September 2021

Long Beach City Council directed City staff to work with community stakeholders to create a vision and a feasibility plan for a Cambodian American Cultural Center [CACC]

May 2022

City of Long Beach initiated the community visioning process for a CACC

June 2022

Cultural leaders were invited to serve on the Cambodian American Cultural Center Community Steering and Honorary Committees

June 2022 – March 2023

City Fabrick and United Cambodian Community implemented a robust community engagement process and Lord Cultural Resources developed a draft feasibility study with the guidance of the Steering Committee.

Key Findings

Cambodian American Cultural Center



Including but not limited to:


- Opportunities to be **immersed in Khmer culture** by offering classes and **hosting events around Cambodian history and tradition**
- Become a "destination," improving the local economy, and promoting Cambodian culture to all; safe, welcoming, and inclusive
- Help bridge generational and cultural gaps by developing cultural programs, classes, and events for multiple ages
- While the CACC should welcome all, it should <u>target Cambodian American youth</u>
- Community members desired the CACC site to be located in <u>Cambodia Town</u>. A second option would be a location outside of Cambodian Town given financial feasibility and development opportunities.
- Opportunities to learn about and be immersed in Khmer culture through classes and Cambodian history and tradition
- Reflect **traditional Khmer/Buddhist values** such as respect and family at the CACC

Feasibility Study

Organization & Structure

- Formation of different committees or working groups
- Creation of a nonprofit organization
- Advisory support and coordination from the City of Long Beach and various City Departments
- Consistent programming until development happens
- Continued communication with Steering Committee and community members
- Creation of website and social media accounts dedicated to the CACC





Development

- The CACC should ideally be located in the Cambodia Town neighborhood, preferably near MacArthur Park, Mark Twain Library, and the Killing Fields Memorial along Anaheim Street. A second option would be a location outside of Cambodia Town given financial feasibility and development opportunities.
- The CACC may be built together with other community-based organizations, civic uses, or on the ground floor of a new housing development
- Accommodate various modes of transportation, and incorporate ADA accessibility
- The interior and exterior spaces should be flexible to allow for a variety of programs that the community has expressed interest in



Development [continued]

- Parking is important and the community is open to shared parking with other uses
- Should be architecturally significant and serve as a landmark for the community
- Create a gift and souvenir shop that sells authentic Khmer items and locally-sold ware created by Cambodian and Cambodian American artists and craftsmen



Programming

Foster cultural preservation and learning through rotating and permanent exhibits and programs including, but not limited to:

- Khmer and English language classes
- Cambodian and Cambodian American art
- Khmer performing arts
- Traditional crafts
- Cooking classes
- History exhibitions
- Mental health
- Youth development
- Healing spaces



Programming [continued]

Develop and strengthen partnerships with the following local and relevant entities and organizations to lead or co-host programming:

- Arts & culture nonprofits
- Temples and religious institutions
- Academic institutions
- Community groups/resident leaders
- Cambodian-owned businesses
- Youth organizations
- Social service providers
- Non-Long Beach Cambodian cultural sites
- African American and Latino American Cultural Centers



Programming [continued]

Celebrate the achievements and adversities of Cambodian history, fostering pride in Khmer heritage, by focusing on and raising awareness of the following within and outside the City of Long Beach:

- Khmer American refugee experience and transitioning to life in America
- Narratives outside of solely the Khmer Rouge and the Golden Age
- The strengths and achievements of the Cambodian American community

Highlight the various religious beliefs, traditions, etiquette, ethics, and healing practices of Cambodian culture, reflecting traditional Khmer/Buddhist values such as respect and family-centeredness by working closely with temples that often host Khmer celebrations



Programming [continued]

Create a space for community economic development, improving the City of Long Beach local economy through:

- Creating job opportunities
- Workforce development
- Supporting Cambodian-owned businesses and entrepreneurs
- Technology and innovation
- Youth mentorship
- Volunteer opportunities

Use inclusive and relevant languages and messaging when creating educational or informational materials and signage with the public



Future Actions



- Non-profit to be created to lead Cambodian American Cultural Center efforts
- United Cambodian Community received grant funding through the California Department of Social Services Stop the Hate Program. UCC will use this funding to obtain a more accurate history of Cambodians in Long Beach that can be integrated as part of the future CACC.
- <u>Continued City Support</u>: City to transition from a facilitative to an advisory role
