Willow Springs Park Wetlands Restoration Opens

A grand opening ceremony for the Willow Springs Park wetlands restoration at 2755 Orange Avenue was held on Saturday, October 21.

The Wetlands Restoration is a 12-acre project within the 48-acre Willow Springs Park that features a walking loop through water-capturing bioswales that flow to 43,000 square feet of restored seasonal wetlands, 12 acres of open space with native plants and trees, a constructed spring that mimics the artesian spring that provided water to early Long Beach, a water retention basin that cleans and diverts water from the Los Angeles River to be reused on site, and an outdoor classroom for environmental education.

The project included the removal of non-native trees and damaged piping, the planting of approximately 200 native and riparian tree species and 6,440 native drought-tolerant plants, installation of 209,000 square feet of irrigation, construction of 43,000 square feet of ponding areas and 1,700 square feet of bioswales, and conversion of a dirt access road to a 2,400-foot pedestrian trail with public access via entry points at Orange and California Avenues.

Funding for the project included the Urban Greening for Sustainable Communities Grant Program, funded by the State of California Natural Resources Agency through Proposition 84, which awarded Long Beach \$924,000 in June 2014.



Bixby Dog Park Opens to the Public

An opening ceremony for the new Dog Park at Bixby Park, 130 Cherry Avenue was held on November 4.

The dog park was developed in response to a large community outreach effort by both Councilmember Jeannine Pearce and Councilwoman Suzie Price. They helped determine that the park should be located at the corner of Broadway and Cherry with separate play areas for large and small breeds.

“This dog park is the latest element of the Bixby Park Master plan to be completed and enhance park amenities for residents,” said Councilmember Jeannine Pearce. The first phase of plan, a new playground and fitness loop, opened in September 2015.

“Dog owners in both the 2nd and 3rd Council Districts will benefit from this new dog park” said Councilmember Suzie Price. “The area further activates the park, helping to reduce crime, and builds a sense of community that brings people together.”

The cost for the development of the dog park was approximately \$100,000, with funding coming from the Second and Third Council District one-time infrastructure funds.

New Houghton Park Community Center Plans



Residents got a preview of the new Houghton Park Community Center when plans were revealed by Vice Mayor Rex Richardson on October 18 at Houghton Park.


The new facility will be an addition to the existing community center that was built as a series of connected buildings from the 1930's and 1980's.

The new 6,450 square-foot building will have two large multipurpose rooms, a central area for restrooms and reception, and two park-facing restrooms to provide park goers with restroom access without entering the building.

The Center was designed with sustainability and energy efficiency in mind, earning the building a Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Silver rating. Drought tolerant landscaping will reduce water usage, and polycarbonate panels will bring natural daylight into multipurpose rooms and reduce energy costs. The project includes Electric Vehicle (EV) parking, school bus loading and unloading zones, and additional bicycle parking to accommodate various transportation methods.

The project is made possible with a \$4 million fund from Measure A and \$3 million from FY 14 one-time funds.

Animal Care Services Update

Living With Urban Coyotes Seminar



On October 12, Long Beach Animal Care Services hosted a seminar, "Living with Urban Coyotes" to provide information for residents about local coyotes. The presenters were Dr. Eric Strauss, Executive Director of the Loyola Marymount University's Center for Urban Resilience (CUREs), California Fish and Game Senior Officer Kent Smirl, and Ted Stevens, Manager of Long Beach Animal Care Services. More than 130 residents learned about coyote ecology and safety, the Long Beach Coyote Management Plan and the CUREs Coyote Assessment Project in Long Beach, being led by Dr. Strauss, to study the local coyote population. Both presenters stressed key facts about coyotes that were supported by the CUREs study:

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- ◆ Coyotes congregate near human food sources and are primarily active nocturnally.
- ◆ Unsecured garbage and outside pet feeding bowls should be removed to deter coyotes.
- ◆ Removing or killing coyotes increases the number of coyotes in an area
- ◆ When encountering a coyote, never ignore or run from the coyote, but respond aggressively. Use hazing techniques including yelling and waving arms, banging pots and pans, using squirt guns, throwing tennis balls or rocks, and using whistles or air horns.
- ◆ Coyote hazing changes coyote behavior and this learned behavior is passed on to family members.

The Long Beach Coyote Management Plan describes how to balance respect for, and protection of wildlife and their habitats, while prioritizing public safety. During the 2016-2017 fiscal year ending on September 30, PRM Maintenance Operations completed some impressive accomplishments that included:

Know Your Long Beach Parks: Honoring Our Veterans in Long Beach Parks

Long Beach veterans have served their country and community with courage, some even losing their lives so the rest of us can be free. In Long Beach there is a connection between veterans and the names of Long Beach parks including Houghton, Admiral Isaac Kidd, Mac Arthur, Veterans, Heartwell and Belmont Veterans Memorial Pier



Admiral Kidd Park was named after Long Beach resident, Admiral Isaac C. Kidd, who died in the attack on Pearl Harbor and was commander of the battleship USS Arizona. The highest ranking casualty at Pearl Harbor, he became the first U.S. Navy flag officer killed in action in World War II. He was awarded a Medal of Honor posthumously.

Belmont Veterans Memorial Pier has benches and medallions placed along the length of the pier deck commemorating individual veterans and significant battles.



Heartwell Park was named after Colonel Charles Heartwell who was president of the Water Department in 1939. He was a Lieutenant Colonel in the California National Guard and a member of the California Defense Council during World War I. Heartwell advocated for the City to buy the land for

Heartwell Park with water bonds.

Houghton Park is named after Colonel Sherman Otis Houghton who was a captain and a lieutenant colonel during the Civil War. He was the first representative from



Southern California in the U.S. Congress from 1871 to 1875. Houghton Park is the site of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial and the annual Veterans' Day celebration. Colonel Houghton owned a ranch on the land where Houghton Park stands and his family donated the land to the City for the park.



Mac Arthur Park was named after General Douglas Mac Arthur. In 1942 he was made the Supreme Commander of Allied forces in the southwest Pacific and

by 1945 had liberated the Philippines on the way to a planned invasion of Japan. MacArthur accepted the Japanese surrender in 1945, then led the occupation forces in the reconstruction of Japan.



Veterans Memorial Park In 1952, the park at 101 E. 28th Street was named in recognition of all veterans who have served their country.

Victory Park is located South of Ocean Blvd. between Alamitos South and Hart Place. The park was named Victory Park in 1919 in honor of the victory in World War I.

Two of Long Beach's USTA tennis tournaments were held during September and October 2017 at El Dorado Park Tennis Center. The 88th Annual Long Beach Open Tennis Tournament was held on September 30 through October 1. Players from Simi Valley to Victorville came to Long Beach to compete. One of El Dorado Park's tennis teaching professionals and staff member Leland Dexter had a great tournament by making it into the semi-finals.

On October 20-21, El Dorado Park also hosted the 29th Annual Long Beach Senior Tournament. Players from the age of 30 up to 90 are eligible to register and compete. The senior players who enter this tournament continue to inspire staff year after year. This year five gentlemen in their 80's competed.

USTA Beach Cities Junior Team Tennis is well under way at Billie Jean King Tennis Center (BJK) and El Dorado

Park Tennis Centers. At BJK, True GRIT Tennis Head Coach Richard Nguyen has two teams in both the 10 & under and 12 & under divisions. At El Dorado Park, Southern California Tennis Academy's Coach Cooper Bridge has 24 kids competing on 10's, 12's and 14's age divisions. These kids play their home matches at BJK or El Dorado Park on Saturday afternoons and also travel to other cities to play against other teams. This is a very fun and competitive league for all these young players and provides them a chance to be a part of a team.

In an effort to promote a new competitive tennis tournament format, the Southern California Tennis Association (SCTA) is joining with BJK and El Dorado Park to launch the Wilson FAST4 – Beach Cities Grand Prix Series. They were one of the first tennis facilities asked to participate. Fast4 is an exciting new one-day Round Robin format vs. the traditional Single Elimination format. Matches in the FAST 4 have a shortened format offering a "fast" alternative to traditional tennis. Matches consist of four points games, four game sets and four rules. Games use no-advantage scoring, tie-breaker at 3- all and the first to four games wins the set. Receiver picks side at 3-all. This will provide fun and competition in a one-day round robin format.

The month concluded by hosting the Moore League High School Girls Tennis Championships at the El Dorado Park Tennis Center. The finals are always held on the stadium courts at the Billie Jean King Tennis Center.
