The community celebrated the opening of C. David Molina Park at 4951 Oregon Avenue on August 28. The park is named for Dr. C. David Molina who started the city's first intensive care unit at Pacific Hospital in 1962 and served as the hospital's Emergency Department Director for 21 years.

"Dr. Molina showed compassion to people who needed it the most," said Mayor Robert Garcia. "He cared for patients like they were family, and I'm proud that this park will add to his legacy as a champion of the community."



The 3.3-acre park was built as part of a development agreement with the Riverdale residential tract. It includes a sports field, playground, restroom facility, walking path, parking, and landscaping. The sports field uses synthetic

turf with energy-efficient field lights and fencing, which provide additional hours of play for Long Beach sports organizations. The decomposed granite walking path and fitness stations provide an opportunity for healthy outdoor exercise. The playground features structures focused on children and youth ages 2 to 12, that include a climbing structure, safety surfacing and colorful shade structures. Park benches, bike racks, picnic tables, landscaping, and parking were designed to complement the park use.

Prior to the show, families enjoyed the Kid Zone and purchased dinner from food trucks, including the Cheddar Wheel, Chowdown Food and Yogurtland.

"I am proud of the nine-year partnership between Parks, Recreation and Marine and the Long Beach Convention and Visitor's Bureau to promote "100 Days of Summer" events on a user-friendly website calendar," said Mayor Robert Garcia. "Families have benefitted from knowing about all the great free recreation options available throughout the city to 'Stay and Play in Long Beach."

Trinity is the result of multi-instrumentalist Rich Graham pulling together players to replicate three of rock's heavyweight bands, Styx, Foreigner and Journey. He along with vocalist Stu Saddoris, guitarist Sean Michael Clegg, drummer Ty Dennis and bassist Adam Levy, perform the greatest hits of the bands in individual sets.

"This concert was the final event in the '100 Days of Summer' program for 2018," said Parks, Recreation and Marine Director Geraldo Mouet. "Since Memorial Day weekend, residents have enjoyed free concerts and movies, extended recreation hours at City parks, El Dorado Nature Center and historic site events, and spontaneous fun like hiking, biking, golf, tennis, and swimming."

All City Beach Day Creates Memories for Long Beach Youth



On August 16, approximately 2,000 youth from PRM park and aquatic day camps, Fun Day programs, WRAP sites and Teen Centers came to Claremont Beach for the Annual All-City Beach Day. The event provided an opportunity for many youth to experience the ocean for the first time, and for all kids to meet campers and program participants from across the city as well as enjoy a day that created life-long memories.

The day was about playing at the beach, bodysurfing, dunking your friends with buckets of water, getting buried in the sand, and having fun with beach games. More than 200 energetic PRM staff kept the events going, encouraged shy kids to try something new, and kept everyone safe. PRM's Teen Volunteer and Counselor in Training participants helped to supervise and lead activities.

All-City Beach Day was supported by the contributions of partners who donated both financial resources and in-kind services to make the event a success.

For the third year in a row, the Los Angeles Kings hockey team sponsored the event. Again this year, they provided a pizza lunch and handed out backpacks and school supplies for each child. Bailey, the Kings' six-foot lion mascot greeted the youth and the Kings' Ice Crew and Chariot organized street hockey games for all the kids to enjoy.

Diversified Production Services, LLC and Live Nation Worldwide Inc. funded the buses to transport the youth from program sites to the beach. The Long Beach Airport distributed flying discs, sunscreen and lip balm. The Long Beach Fire Department added to the excitement by spraying the crowd with water from their rescue boat.

Parks and Recreation Commissioners, and staff from all PRM bureaus helped to set up, serve food, and clean up. Using large bulldozers, Beach Maintenance crews formed a large sand dune for climbing, rolling and jumping.

The event perfectly embodied the 2018 summer camp theme of "creating memories" that will live with thousands of kids for a lifetime.

PRM LA84 Aquatic Programs Conclude

This summer a total of \$30,000 in LA84 Foundation Summer Splash Swim grant funds supported 1,064 youth participants in PRM aquatic programs. This included 216 competitive scholarships to participants in eight-week swim teams for ages 7-17 at City pools and at Cabrillo, Jordan and Millikan High School Pools. Competitive dive teams were held at Silverado and King Pools, and Silverado Pool offered an artistic swim team.

At the Richard R. Miller Novice Swim Meet on July 28, at Belmont Plaza Pool, youth competed in events including 25 to 100 yard swims with butterfly, backstroke, freestyle, breaststroke, and individual medley. The Richard R. Miller Novice Dive meet was held on August 5 at Silverado Park Pool. The top swim and dive team performers qualified to advance in LA84 swim events.

On August 10, PRM sponsored the annual Leeway Sailing Center Sabot Regatta for young sailors to test their boating skills, and also the Model Boat Regatta where participants launched their model boats to test their sea worthiness in Colorado Lagoon.







Artistic Swimming Championships

Artistic Swim Coaches Melissa Miramontes and Elizabeth Preciado worked with their team to build confidence, promote teamwork, and teach basic to advanced concepts of artistic swimming during an eight-week session. Their Belmont team took two first-place, one second-place, and one third-place medal at the LA84 Artistic Swim Festival. The competition was challenging, against agencies like Los Angeles County and the City of Los Angeles. The girls won their number one spot with hard work and dedication. One of the best moments at the competition was when the Belmont Artistic team beat LA County by taking first-place and second-place in their age division group for trios. Although, Long Beach took home two first-place medals, the youngest and newest team lost and is resolved to work harder and be better next year. "You win some, you lose some," said Coach Elizabeth Preciado, RLS V, who guickly cheered up the girls and capped off a memorable summer.

The Long Beach Marine Bureau's Harbor Breeze Yacht Charters welcomed the Sir Winston, a new dinner cruise vessel, to Rainbow Harbor on July 24. The Sir Winston is a 130-foot long ship that can ac-

commodate 500 passengers on multiple levels including sunset and sky view decks. The amenities include four bars, eight bathrooms, dance floors, an elevator and banquet seating for 350. The \$5.3 million-dollar state of the art vessel was built in 2017 by Winston Knauss in Florida. The Sir Winston will dock at Rainbow Harbor Dock 3.



In August, the Greenpeace ship Arctic Sunrise began a two-week visit to Rainbow Harbor. Free ship tours were an opportunity for the crew to share information about plastic pollution in oceans and to promote the idea of reducing the use of fossil fuels. The

163-foot long icebreaker ship has a 16 person crew and can sleep up to 34. It has traveled the world encouraging environmental stewardship.

Know Your Long Beach Parks: Locust Tot Lot

All-Inclusive Swings Added at Los Altos Park

The 4,050 square-foot "Locust Tot Lot" at 2331 Locust Avenue may be small, but has a big impact on its neighborhood by providing a place for children to play.

The play area opened in 2016 and features a colorful twoto-five-year-old play structure, with climbing and exploratory features and a slide. There is also a set of swings, safety surfacing, and a series of interactive play panels. The seating area will include two benches and two picnic tables connected by an ADA accessible walkway, as well as a bike rack, trees and mulch.

The Locust Tot Lot is part of 26 acres of new parkland to open in the Sixth Council District in recent years along with NAACP Freedom Park, Jenni Rivera Memorial Park, Rosa Parks Park, and the Chittick Field Sports Complex.



Three new all-inclusive swings have been installed at Los Altos Park. The need for playground equipment for children of all abilities was raised by Fourth Council District resident Don Allison. Don had been taking his granddaughter Olivia to playgrounds outside the area to use accessible equipment. The Office of Councilman Daryl Supernaw provided the funding for the new equipment. On August 15, Olivia's family and friends gathered to celebrate the installation.
