AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LONG BEACH AMENDING THE LONG BEACH MUNICIPAL CODE BY ADDING SECTION 16.52.2370 RELATING TO THE DESIGNATION OF THE PROPERTY LOCATED AT 4204 CEDAR AVENUE AS A HISTORIC LANDMARK

The City Council of the City of Long Beach ordains as follows:

Section 1. Section 16.52.2370 is added to the Long Beach Municipal Code to read as follows:

16.52.2370 The Brady House.

- A. Pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 2.63 of the Long Beach Municipal Code and with the September 29, 2020 recommendation of the Cultural Heritage Commission, the City Council designates the Brady House located at 4204 Cedar Avenue as a Long Beach local historic landmark.

RESOLUTION NO.

A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF LONG BEACH ESTABLISHING A HISTORIC RESOURCES DESIGNATION FOR THE BRADY HOUSE LOCATED AT 4204 CEDAR AVENUE, AS PRESCRIBED BY CHAPTER 2.63 OF THE LONG BEACH MUNICIPAL CODE TO BE RECORDED PURSUANT TO THE AUTHORITY OF GOVERNMENT CODE SECTION 27288.2 AND PUBLIC RESOURCES CODE SECTION 5029

The City Council of the City of Long Beach does hereby resolve as follows:

Section 1. This Resolution is adopted pursuant to the authority and mandate of California Public Resources Code Section 5029 in order to provide recorded notice to current and future owners of the affected properties that such properties have been designated as historical landmarks.

Section 3. The legal description for the Brady House located at 4204 Cedar Avenue is set forth on Exhibit "A", attached hereto and incorporated herein as though set forth in full. The owner of the Brady House is Lewis M. Kallas.

Section 4. Designation as a Historic Landmark. Pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 2.63 of the Long Beach Municipal Code and upon the recommendation of the Cultural Heritage Commission, the City Council of the City of

Long Beach hereby designates the Brady House located at 4204 Cedar Avenue as a local historic landmark based on satisfying significance criteria "C", as defined in the City's Cultural Heritage Commission Ordinance (Long Beach Municipal Code, Section 2.63.050). The designation of the Brady House as a local historic landmark has been codified in Section 16.52.2370 of the Long Beach Municipal Code.

A. Basis for Recommendation:

- 1. <u>Property Description</u>: The Brady House is a late example of the Mid-Century Modern architectural style. The building features Killingsworth's signature architectural detailing and the building proportions, and scale that define his work. The house has a privacy wall made with opaque glass and wood that screens an open-air courtyard. The tall front door is reminiscent of the Case Study House #25. The building has floor-to-ceiling glass front walls, high vaulted ceilings, and wood beams. The exterior also features vertical tongue and groove wood cladding and stucco finishes.
- 2. <u>Significance</u>: This building was designed by Long Beach architect Ed Killingsworth for this architectural firm partner Jules Brady under the firm Killingsworth, Brady and Smith (KBS). The building was originally constructed in 1970 and is 50 year of age meeting the minimum eligibility requirement for historic structures. The structure is considered to be the final single-family residential project designed by Ed Killingsworth, whose notable work includes the Case Study House #25 at 82 Rivo Alto Way, Opdahl House at 5576 Vesuvia Way, the KBS office at 3827 Long Beach Boulevard, and his work at California State University, Long Beach as the University's master architect.

B. Rational for historic landmark designation:

The City Council finds that relative to the designation of the Brady House located at 4204 Cedar Avenue as a local historic landmark, the

"C" <u>It embodies the distinctive characteristics of a type, period or</u> method of construction, or it represents the work of a master or it possesses high artistic values.

The structure was designed by master architect Ed Killingsworth and is a late example of Mid-Century Modern architectural style and has a distinctive characteristic that reflects the Modern architectural style. The building features Ed Killingsworth's signature architectural detailing and the building proportions, and scale that define his work. Ed Killingsworth's work is influential as he gained an exemplary reputation throughout the country.

- Section 5. General guidelines and standards for any changes.
- A. Any maintenance, repair, stabilization, rehabilitation, restoration, preservation, conservation, or reconstruction work proposed for the building shall be conducted in a manner consistent with the "Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties with Guidelines for Preserving, Rehabilitating, Restoring, and Reconstructing Historic Buildings" (1995), by Weeks and Grimmer, as amended, as well as the "Procedures for Certificate of Appropriateness" (the "Standards") found in Section 2.63.080 of the Long Beach Municipal Code.
- B. The Standards are incorporated herein by this reference and shall be used as the authoritative guidelines for reviewing and approving any proposed exterior work on the building.
- C. The provisions of this Resolution shall regulate the building's exterior walls and other external features. There shall be no restrictions on the building's interior.
- D. Original historic fabric on the exterior of the building shall be executed in a matter that does not materially impair in an adverse manner

Section 7. This Resolution shall take effect on the same date the ordinance referred to in Section 2 of this Resolution becomes effective, and the City Clerk shall certify the vote adopting this Resolution.
