MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING REGARDING HAZARDOUS MATERIALS INCIDENTS

This MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING ("MOU") is made and
entered, in duplicate, as of, for reference purposes only, pursuant
to a minute order adopted by the City Council of the City of Long Beach at its meeting or
December 8, 2020 , by and between CITY OF SANTA FE SPRINGS, a municipal
corporation, with a place of business at 11710 Telegraph Road, Santa Fe Springs, CA
90670, and the CITY OF LONG BEACH, a municipal corporation, with a place of
business at 411 W. Ocean Blvd, Long Beach, CA 90802.

WHEREAS, The City of Santa Fe Springs has delegated the Fire Department, under the supervision of the Fire Chief, to respond to and take necessary actions for the safe mitigation of hazardous materials spills, releases, and related incidents. The Fire Department's hazardous materials response team is comprised of personnel from the Fire Prevention, Environmental Protection, and Fire Suppression Divisions; and

WHEREAS, The City of Long Beach has delegated the Fire Department, under the supervision of the Fire Chief, to respond to and take necessary actions for the safe mitigation of hazardous materials spills, releases, and related incidents; and

WHEREAS, The purpose of this MOU is to provide an emergency response to hazardous materials (Hazmat) incidents within the boundaries of the City of Long Beach and Area "E". The response will be made by trained staff and equipment from each city capable of "Level A" entries;

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual provisions, covenants, and conditions contained, it is mutually agreed by and between parties hereto as follows:

1. **DEFINITIONS:**

A. <u>Hazardous Materials (Hazmat)</u> shall have the meaning set forth, in Section 8589.2 of the Government Code of the State of California.

- B. <u>Santa Fe Springs Fire Department Hazardous Materials Team</u> shall be a minimum of five (5) personnel trained and certified at the Hazmat Technician Level or greater and one (1) Hazmat vehicle.
- C. <u>Long Beach Fire Department Hazardous Materials Response</u> shall be a minimum of ten (10) personnel trained and certified at the Hazmat Specialist Level or greater.
- D. <u>Hazmat 24</u> shall be a minimum of four (4) personnel trained and certified at the Hazmat Specialist Level or greater and one (1) Hazmat vehicle.
- E. <u>Area "E"</u> is a section of California Region 1 Operational Area that includes the cities of Compton, Downey, Montebello, La Habra Heights, and Santa Fe Springs.
- F. <u>Decontamination Team</u> shall be a minimum of four (4) personnel trained and certified at the Hazmat First Responder Operational Level or greater with the appropriate equipment to effectively and efficiently decontaminate personnel and equipment.
- G. <u>Incident Command System (ICS)</u> shall have the meaning set forth in Section 8607 of the Government Code of the State of California.
- H. <u>Level "A" Entry</u> shall have the meaning set forth in Appendix B to Section 5192 of the California Code of Regulation.
- I. National Incident Management System (NIMS) shall have the meaning set forth in Section 8607 of the Government Code of the State of California.
- J. <u>Agency Representative</u> shall be a Chief Officer or Designee of the responding agency's Fire Chief.

2. RESPONSE:

Long Beach Hazmat personnel will respond into Area "E" and Santa Fe Springs Hazmat personnel will respond into the City of Long Beach by request only. This request will be made by the Incident Commander and/or by request of the responding Hazmat team en route through the Incident Commander. The request for Long Beach Hazmat personnel to respond into Area "E" will be for a Hazardous Materials Response (10 personnel) or Hazmat 24 (four personnel). The request for Santa Fe Springs Hazmat personnel to respond into the City of Long Beach will be for a Hazmat Team with a minimum of five (5) personnel. Each city agrees to provide a decontamination team. The team traveling the farthest will be expected to be on-scene within forty-five (45) minutes. The teams will meet at the site of the emergency and coordinate with the Incident Commander and/or Group Supervisor for assignment. An Agency Representative may respond at the discretion of the responding agency.

3. COMMAND STRUCTURE:

The unified team will operate under the command structure of the city where the incident occurs using the Incident Command System, and when appropriate, the National Incident Management System. They will use recognized and jointly accepted protocols. Nevertheless, each team captain will retain the authority to withdraw that city's team in case of imminent danger to life or limb of a team member.

4. SCOPE:

The unified team will analyze, and take any remedial action deemed necessary and safe. They will recommend evacuations as needed, do containment, and cleanup within the capability of personnel and equipment.

5. <u>LEVEL OF TRAINING:</u>

All team members will be trained and certified to the Hazmat Technician Level or greater. Each city will be responsible for keeping such certification

current.

6. <u>IN-SERVICE TRAINING:</u>

Each city will host and organize one (1) field exercise drill per year. The field exercise drill will be held on the months agreed upon between the Hazmat training coordinators from each city with an attempt to schedule three (3) different days encompassing all three (3) shifts. The host city will pay the expenses and costs of the drill which it organizes.

7. **COMMUNICATIONS**:

When responding into Area "E" (Compton, Downey, Montebello, or Santa Fe Springs) units will respond on UHF, Channel XLE CMD (482.250N). When responding into the City of Long Beach, units will respond on VHF, Channel LOB 1 (153.950). Responding teams may be directed to other command or tactical frequencies en route as necessary. The Hazmat team may use additional approved frequencies as needed to support entry operations. Cellular telephones may also be used as conditions and equipment availability allow.

8. <u>COST RECOVERY:</u>

Each city will pay for materials and labor costs of its team. In the event of a Hazmat spill, release, or other incident, if the party responsible is identified, every attempt will be made by the host city to recover cost reimbursement for materials, labor costs, and damaged equipment for all cities. If legal action is required, each city shall be joined as a party, shall have the right to pursue its own causes of action, and shall bear its own costs and attorney fees.

9. <u>INDEMNIFICATION:</u>

Each city agrees to preserve and save harmless the other cities and each officer and employee thereof from any liability or responsibility for any accident, loss, or damage to persons or property happening or occurring as a proximate result of the negligence of such indemnifying city, its officers, or employees.

10. EMPLOYEES:

The members of a city's team shall not be considered employees of the other city for any purpose including but not limited to workers' compensation, medical benefits, sick leave, disability benefits, or retirement.

11. TERM OF AGREEMENT:

This agreement will remain in effect unless and until terminated by a ninety(90) day notice in writing from the City of Long Beach or the City of Santa Fe
Springs. Adjustments or amendments may be made upon agreement in writing by both cities.
