Houghton Park Community Center Dedicated as Doris Topsy-Elvord Community Center

The City of Long Beach dedicated the newly renovated Houghton Park Community Center as the Doris Topsy-Elvord Community Center in a ceremony on August 21.

Following an item brought forth by Vice Mayor Rex Richardson and approved by the City Council, the naming of the complex recognizes the legacy, contributions and service of community leader Vice Mayor Doris Topsy-Elvord.

Doris Topsy-Elvord has lived in Long Beach for more than 75 years and has always been an advocate for equity. She became the first Black woman elected to the Long Beach City Council in 1992 and served twice as Vice Mayor of the city. She also was the first Black person and the

third woman to serve on the Port of Long Beach Harbor Commission. She helped co-found Long Beach's African American Heritage Society and led historic designation efforts on the home of civil rights pioneers Ernest and Lillian McBride.

The new community center, which opened in 2020, offers 30,000 square feet of programmable space, a 6,400-square foot LEED-certified conference area, a social hall, two large multipurpose rooms, a weightlifting gym, computer lab, outdoor courtyards and a sound and plant garden. The original Houghton clubhouse, a historic landmark originally built in 1930, also remains on the site at 6301 Myrtle Ave.

The presentation of the department's strategic plan will be scheduled for City Council review and approval in October. We appreciate the thousands of Long Beach community members who participated in the survey over the past two years whose voices and input have helped shape many of the recommendations to a considerable extent. Park Planning and Partnerships Bureau team members did an amazing job with community outreach and engagement that will be reflected in a plan that will help lead many aspects of parks and recreation programming and operations in the coming decade.

Summer programming pivoted seamlessly to our ‘After School’ mode as area youth returned to classes. Health protocol compliance continues to be central to all our programs and events this autumn for safe and fun outcomes. Kudos to all our Community Recreation Services team members for their creativity and leadership throughout the summer for our youth, seniors, and families.

Our parks, beaches and marinas were all well maintained throughout the summer crush of use and enjoyment by Long Beach residents and visitors. Quality maintenance remains a high priority for our Marine Bureau and Maintenance Operations Bureau team members. Our department has appreciated the increased interest by neighborhood groups and volunteers to help activate and assist in clean-up and beautification initiatives.

Animal Care Services has the “Adoption Waggin’” out in the community on scheduled Saturdays to promote and make available cats and dogs for adoption and fostering. Autumn may be the best season for you to “fall” in love with a furry friend and welcome it into your home.

The **Youth ARISE (Adaptive Recreation in a Special Environment)** program is an adaptive program for middle school and high school ages featuring recreational and enrichment activities. The camp will take place at Stearns Champions Park, 4520 E. 23rd St., from 9:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. on Saturdays December 18 (holidays excluded). The fee is \$4 per session.

ARISE for Adults at Stearns Champions Park provides art, games and fitness activities for individuals 18 and over with special needs. This program is offered from 2 - 5 p.m. Mondays through Fridays through December 30 (holidays excluded). The fee is \$15 per weekly session.

Register online for both ARISE programs at LBParks.org. In-person registration is available at Stearns Champions Park by appointment only. An in-take meeting is required for new participants. Call 562.440.2867 for more information. Both programs follow enhanced safety protocols for the health and safety of both participants and staff, and a 5:1 participant-to-staff ratio is maintained.

Partners Of Parks Fundraising Campaign To Rebuild Admiral Kidd Playground



The non-profit Partners of Parks organization has announced a campaign to raise \$1 million to fund the rebuild of the nautical-themed playground structure at Admiral Kidd Park, located at 2125 Santa Fe Avenue.

West Long Beach residents suffered a devastating loss in the early-morning hours of July 18, 2021, when the playground was severely damaged by fire. The original, nautical-themed playground opened in 2011 as part of a park-expansion project.

"Our goal is to rebuild the playground with additional enhancements to 2021 standards and improvements based on input made by the community," said Parks, Recreation, and Marine Director Brent Dennis.

"The destruction of the Admiral Kidd Playground is a tragedy that destroyed a play space after 15 months of relative isolation during a pandemic, in an already park-starved community" shared POP Executive Director, Trinka Rowsell. "Partners of Parks is excited to rally the community by raising the needed funds to rebuild the playground back better than ever and restoring this safe space for west-side children and families."

Admiral Kidd Park is located in an area of the community that would benefit from more park space and amenities. The park site was formerly used by the armed forces during World War II, according to the city's website. In commemoration, the park was named for Rear Admiral Isaac C. Kidd, who was killed during the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor in 1941, which influenced the nautical-themed design of the playground.

The campaign begins September 1st and ends December 1st, and includes a naming opportunity for the top funding level of \$250,000. Funding levels go all the way down to the \$2,500 level and includes opportunities for community members to purchase commemorative bricks on the walkway approaching the playground. Partners of Parks is the non-profit that supports programming, activities and neighborhood groups who fund events in Long Beach parks. The organization supports the Long Beach Parks, Recreation and Marine Department by working with donors to fund City programming benefiting teens, seniors and families-in-need; the Youth Scholarship Program helps LBUSD students who qualify to attend PRM fee-based recreation classes without charge.

Long Beach Youth Festival to Bring Resources and Inspiration to Local Youth



The Long Beach Youth Festival 2021 will be the inaugural event of the Long Beach Commission on Youth and Families and the City of Long Beach's new Office of Youth Development that will bring together youth, families, and other stakeholders on Saturday, September 25 from 8:30 a.m.–3 p.m. at Houghton Park, 6301 Myrtle Avenue.

The festival will consist of youth-centric seminars and panels for people between the ages of 12-24 covering topics such as Planning for the Future: Economic and Educational Opportunities, Know Your Rights (Housing, Education etc.), Health and Wellness (including Mental Health, Social Connectedness, and Relationship Building), Public Safety and Community Engagement, Environmental Justice, and Leadership and Organizing.

In addition, the festival will offer performances and showcases from local poets, writers, singers, and dancers, as well as interactive/fun activities and a resource fair that will be open to families and children.

Know Your Long Beach Park: Valparaiso Plaza



The .48-acre Valparaiso Plaza sits on a portion of what was formerly Bixby Park. When the beach parking lot was constructed in 1968, Junipero Avenue was extended down the bluff to access the parking lot, separating this half-acre lot from the rest of Bixby Park.

Beachgoers on their way to Junipero Beach pass a canon perched on the bluff that points out over the ocean. The canon guarded the City of Valparaiso for over 100 years and their citizens donated the canon to Long Beach in 1976 as a symbol of the strength of the sister city relationship between the two cities. In the same year, the Long Beach City Council renamed this area of Bixby Park Valparaiso Plaza.
