Recommendation to request City Council approval of the 2019 Federal Legislative Agenda as recommended by the Federal Legislative Committee.

Each year the City Council adopts a Federal Legislative Agenda, which outlines the City's federal legislative priorities for the coming year. This document provides policy direction to staff on federal issues, and allows the City to support, oppose or work with our federal legislative delegates to advance priorities adopted by the City Council.

The Federal Legislation Committee (Committee) met on March 12, 2019, received staff's recommended changes for the 2019 Federal Legislative Agenda and voted to forward those changes, along with three additional changes from the Committee to the City Council for consideration and adoption. The Committee's proposed changes are described below:

## About Long Beach

Demographic data is being updated to reflect the U.S. Census Bureau's most recent estimates. This sentence will now read, "The City is ethnically diverse with: 42.8% Latino/Hispanic, 27.6% Caucasian, 12.9% Black or African American, 13.2% Asian, 1.2% American Indian and Alaskan Native, and 0.9% Native Hawaiian and other Pacific Islander."
